

JAMES G. SHANAHAN WAS BORN IN SYRACUSE, NEW YORK, APRIL 23, 1920. HE GRADUATED FROM NIAGARA UNIVERSITY AT NEW YORK, IN 1942, HE RECEIVED HIS U. S. ARMY RESERVE COMMISSION IN MAY, 1942 AND ENTERED THE ARMY JULY 6TH OF THAT YEAR.

IN JULY OF 1944, COLONEL SHANAHAN WAS ASSIGNED TO THE 1ST BAT-TALION, 35TH INFANTRY. HE FIRST SERVED AS A PLATOON LEADER OF A RIFLE COMPANY AND THEN WENT ON TO BECOME THE COMPANY COMMANDER.

IN NOVEMBER, 1945, AS A CAPTAIN, COLONEL SHANAHAN SERVED WITH THE 25TH INFANTRY DIVISION AS THE ASSISTANT G-3. IN JANUARY OF THE FOLLOWING YEAR, HE WAS ASSIGNED TO THE G-2 SECTION AND IN MAY BECAME THE G-2 FOR THE DIVISION.

IN NOVEMBER OF 1952 DURING THE KOREAN WAR, AS A MAJOR, HE SERVED WITH THE 2ND BATTALION, 38TH INFANTRY AS THE BATTALION EXECUTIVE OFFICER. IN FEBRUARY OF THE FOLLOWING YEAR, COLONEL SHANAHAN BECAME THE BATTALION COMMANDER OF THE 1ST BATTALION, 38TH INFANTRY.

IN JULY, 1966, COLONEL SHANAHAN BECAME THE DEPUTY CHIEF OF STAFF OF I FIELD FORCES VIETNAM. IN SEPTEMBER OF THE SAME YEAR, HE WAS ASSIGNED TO THE 3RD BRIGADE TASK FORCE AS THE BRIGADE'S DEPUTY COMMANDER UNTIL OCTOBER 20TH WHEN HE ASSUMED COMMAND OF THE BRIGADE.

COLONEL SHANAHAN'S FOREIGN ŞERVICE INCLUDES NEARLY THREE YEARS IN THE PACIFIC THEATER FROM 1944 TO 1947, WHEN HE FIRST SERVED WITH THE 25TH INFANTRY "TROPIC LIGHTNING" DIVISION DURING THE LUZON AND NORTHERN SOLOMONS CAMPAIGNS.

DURING THE KOREAN WAR, WHILE COLONEL SHANAHAN WAS ASSIGNED TO THE 38TH INFANTRY, HE PARTICIPATED IN THE KOREAN SUMMER-FALL '52, 3RD KOREAN WINTER, AND KOREAN SUMMER-FALL '53 CAMPAIGNS, HE ALSO HAS SERVED IN SAUDI ARABIA,

DURING HIS NEARLY 24 YEARS IN THE ARMY, COLONEL SHANAHAN HAS COMPLETED TWO COURSES AT THE INFANTRY SCHOOL AT FORT BENNING, GEORGIA AND HAS ATTENDED THE COMMAND AND GENERAL STAFF COLLEGE AT FORT LEAVENWORTH, KANSAS. HE ALSO HAS ATTENDED THE ARMED FORCES STAFF COLLEGE IN 1958 AND THE NATIONAL WAR COLLEGE IN 1963.

COLONEL SHANAHAN'S DECORATIONS INCLUDE THE SILVER STAR, BRONZE STAR WITH V DEVICE AND THREE OAK LEAF CLUSTERS, BRONZE STAR WITH OAK LEAF CLUSTER, ARMY COMMENDATION MEDAL WITH OAK LEAF CLUSTER, THE PURPLE HEART, AND THE COMBAT INFANTRYMAN'S BADGE WITH TWO STARS.

HIS WIFE, PATRICIA, THEIR DAUGHTER KATHLEEN, AND FIVE SONS, JAMES, DAVID, MARK, EDWARD AND JOHN RESIDE AT ALEXANDRIA, VIRGINIA.

JAMES G. SHANAHAN COLONEL COMMANDER



-DEPUTY COMMANDER -

CLINTON E. GRANGER, JR. WAS BORN IN CHAMPAIGN, ILLINOIS, NOV-EMBER 12, 1928. HE WAS GRADUATED FROM THE UNITED STATES MILI-TARY ACADEMY IN 1951 AND COMMISSIONED A SECOND LIEUTENANT OF INFANTRY.

DURING THE KOREAN WAR, COLONEL GRANGER SERVED WITH THE 279TH INFANTRY AS A PLATOON LEADER AND LATER BECAME A COMPANY COMMANDER. HE TOOK PART IN THE KOREAN SUMMER-FALL '52, 3RD KOREAN WINTER, AND KOREAN SUMMER-FALL' 53 CAMPAIGNS.

FROM SEPTEMBER 1953 THROUGH JUNE 1956, HE WAS ASSIGNED TO FORT HOOD, TEXAS WITH A VARIETY OF DUTIES. THESE RANGED FROM BEING A COMPANY COMMANDER WITH THE 702ND AIRBORNE INFANTRY BRIGADE TO BEING ASSIGNED AS LIAISON OFFICER FOR THE BRIGADE HEADQUARTERS. HE THEN WENT ON TO BE ASSIGNED AS THE LIAISON OFFICER WITH THE CHIEF OF STAFF FOR THE 1ST ARMORED DIVISION.

IN AUGUST OF 1962, COLONEL GRANGER WAS ASSIGNED AS THE ASSISTANT G-3 OF IX CORPS HEADQUARTERS. UNITED STATES ARMY PACIFIC AND THEN WAS FURTHER ASSIGNED TO THE SECRETARY GENERAL'S STAFF IN NOVEMBER OF 1963.

IN JULY, 1965, COLONEL GRANGER RETURNED TO FORT HOOD, TEXAS AND WAS ASSIGNED AS THE ASSISTANT G-1 FOR THE III CORPS HEADQUARTERS. HE LATER WENT ON TO BE ASSIGNED AS THE DEPUTY CHIEF OF STAFF FOR THE UNITED STATES ARMY HEADQUARTERS AND THE II FIELD FORCE HEADQUARTERS AT FORT HOOD.

IN JANUARY OF 1966, COLONEL GRANGER FIRST ARRIVED IN VIETNAM AND WAS ASSIGNED TO HEADQUARTERS AND HEADQUARTERS COMPANY II FIELD FORCES VIETNAM ON THE SECRETARY GENERAL'S STAFF. IN AUGUST, HE BECAME THE LIAISON OFFICER AND THEN WENT ON TO BECOME THE SPECIAL ASSISTANT TO THE CHIEF OF STAFF.

COLONEL GRANGER HAS COMPLETED FIVE COURSES AT THE INFANTRY SCHOOL AT FORT BENNING, GEORGIA AND TWO COURSES AT THE COMMAND AND GENERAL STAFF COLLEGE.

COLONEL GRANGER'S DECORATIONS INCLUDE THE COMBAT INFANTRYMAN'S BADGE, BRONZE STAR MEDAL WITH OAK LEAF CLUSTER, ARMY COMMENDATION MEDAL AND THE NATIONAL DEFENSE SERVICE MEDAL WITH OAK LEAF CLUSTER.









10 MAY, 1966 - 26 DEC 1966.

IN DECEMBER 1966 THE 3D BRIGADE TASK FORCE, 25TH INFANTRY DIVISION COMPLETED OPERATION "PAUL REVERE" THROUGH PHASE IV, SETTING THE ARMY RECORD FOR THE LONGEST SUSTAINED COMBAT OPERATION.

THE OPERATION, BEGUN MAY 10TH BY THE 3D BRIGADE TASK FORCE, 25TH INFANTRY DIVISION, REACHED THE 230-DAY MARK ON 26 DECEMBER. THE PREVIOUS RECORD WAS 165 DAYS, SET BY THE 25TH INFANTRY DIVISION IN WORLD WAR II DURING THE PHILIPPINE CAMPAIGN.

SETTING SUCH A RECORD REQUIRED NEARLY 32 WEEKS OF FIELD CONDITIONS AND CONSTANT EXPOSURE TO COMBAT -- SOMETHING NEVER DONE FOR THIS LONG A TIME BEFORE.

DURING THE OPERATION, FOUR MAJOR BATTLES AND COUNTLESS SKIRMISHES WERE FOUGHT BY THE 3D BRIGADE. THE "BIG FOUR" WERE: "THE BATTLE OF 10 ALPHA" MAY 29TH AND 30TH, INVOLVING ELEMENTS OF THE 1ST AND 2ND BATTALION OF THE 35TH INFANTRY PITTED AGAINST ELEMENTS OF AN NVA REGIMENT, "THE NEW BATTLE OF THE IA DRANG," JULY 31ST THROUGH AUGUST 2ND, INVOLVING THE SAME ELEMENTS ON A LARGER SCALE; THE DEFENSIVE BATTLE OF 9 AUGUST IN WHICH A REPUBLIC OF KOREA INFANTRY COMPANY AND A U.S. TANK PLATOON FROM THE 1ST BATTALION, 69TH ARMOR STAVED OFF AN NVA REGIMENT; AND, "THE BATTLE FOR DRAGON CRATER, NOVEMBER 19TH, WHERE THE 1ST BATTALION 14TH INFANTRY FOUGHT AN NVA REGIMENT.

IN THE LONG OPERATION 1,496 ENEMY WERE KILLED BY BODY COUNT, 424 NORTH VIETNAMESE WERE CAPTURED AND 534 OF THEIR WEAPONS WERE SEIZED.

MEN OF THE 3D BRIGADE TASK FORCE ACQUIRED 5 DISTINGUISHED SERVICE CROSSES, 28 SILVER STARS, 212 BRONZE STARS WITH "V"DEVICE, 8 LEGION OF MERIT, AND 24 ARMY COMMENDATION MEDALS WITH "V".

THE VALOR THEY DISPLAYED BROUGHT SOUTH VIETNAM'S PREMIER, NGYEN CAO KY, TO PLEIKU TWICE TO AWARD FOUR GALLANTRY CROSSES WITH PALM, THE HIGHEST AWARD VIETNAM HAS PRESENTED A FOREIGN SOLDIER.

ON THE OTHER FRONT, CIVIC ACTION HAS ACTED TO FREE VILLAGES OF IGNORANCE AND POVERTY AND THE DICTATES OF COMMUNISM, THE 3D BRIGADE TASK FORCE ALONE HAS ISSUED 110 CASES OF CANNED GOODS, 1,500 PIECES OF CLOTHING, NEARLY 185,000 POUNDS OF RICE AND 65 CASES OF SOAP. THEY RELEASED OVER 12-MILLION PROPAGANDA LEAFLETS OVER SUSPECTED ENEMY LOCATIONS, THEY'VE PAID OUT 11,000 PIASTERS (\$9,300) IN RETURN FOR FILLED SANDBAGS AND CLEARED ROADS.

THE BIGGEST ACHIEVEMENT OF "PAUL REVERE" IN THE CIVIC ACTION FIELD WAS THE FREEING OF SOME 400 MONTAGNARDS WHO HAD BEEN ENSLAVED BY THE VIET CONG IN 1962 AND FORCED TO GROW RICE AND TRANSPORT SUPPLIES FOR THE NVA EVER SINCE. WHEN THE BRIGADE BEGAN OPERATIONS AROUND PLEI DJERANG, THE VC FLED AND 400 MONTAGNARDS DRIFTED OUT OF THE MOUNTAINS AND BACK TO THEIR HOMES. THE 3D BRIGADE TASK FORCE PROVIDED FOR THESE REFUGEES, UNTIL THEY COULD HARVEST A RICE CROP.


OPERATION "PAUL REVERE" WAS DIVIDED INTO FOUR PARTS TO DENOTE CHANGES IN OPERA-TIONAL CONTROL. THE 3D BRIGADE TASK FORCE CONTROLLED "PAUL REVERE! AND 111 " EXCLUSIVELY AND PARTICIPATED IN 11 AND IV. THE 1ST AIR CAVALRY (AIRMOBILE) DIVISION CONTROLLED "II" AND THE 4TH INFANTRY DIVISION, COMMANDED BY MAJOR GENERAL ARTHUR S. COLLINS, "IV". THE "BRONCO" BRIGADE HOWEVER, IS THE ONLY UNIT TO HAVE PARTICIPATED IN ALL FOUR PHASES AND HAS COME TO CONSIDER "PAUL REVERE" ITS OWN.

REPLACEMENT



AS COMBAT OPERATIONS CONTINUED THE BRIGADE RECEIVED CONTINUING ALLOTMENTS OF REPLACEMENTS, MOST OF WHOM WERE NEW TO VIET NAM AND HAD NEVER BEEN IN COMBAT. TO MORE FULLY PREPARE THEM FOR WHAT THEY HAD TO FACE, THE BRIGADE ESTABLISHED A REPLACEMENT TRAINING CENTER.
