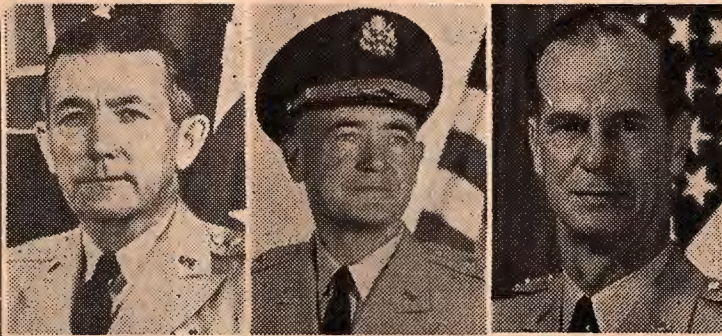

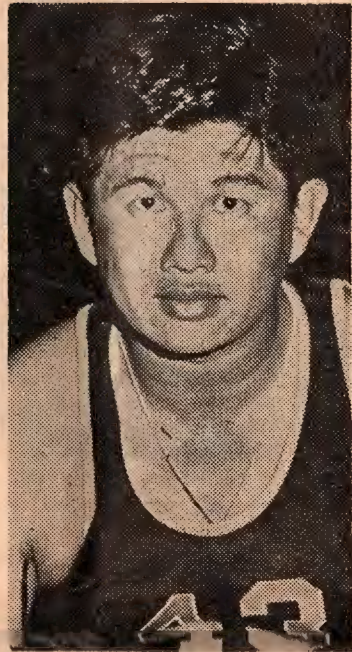
The 35-year total win-loss slate of 7,412 wins against 310 setbacks for a percentage mark of .960 is, without a doubt, amazing.

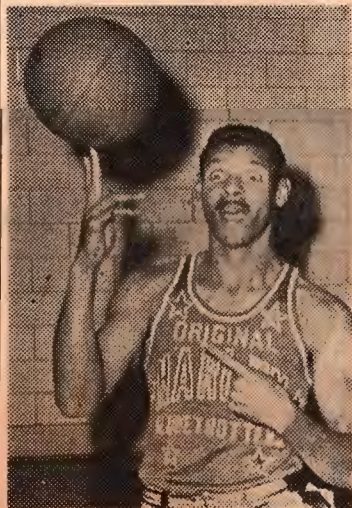
### Former Hounds

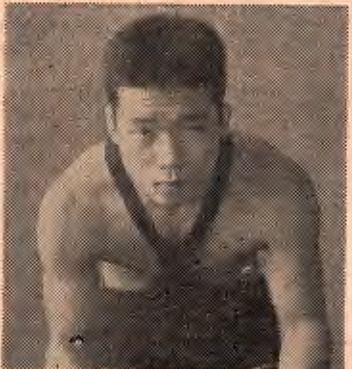
Providing the opposition for the 1962 Japanese National High School Champions will be a composite team of Army, Navy and Marine wrestlers.

Chuck Caldwell hit 24 for the Green.

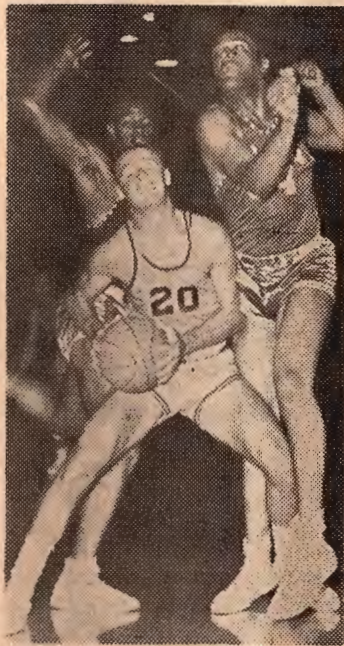
### Gimlets 74, D/A 63

The Navy kicked off and Roby took the kick deep and headed up-field. He was hit hard and fumbled on the eight and Navy recovered, first and goal.

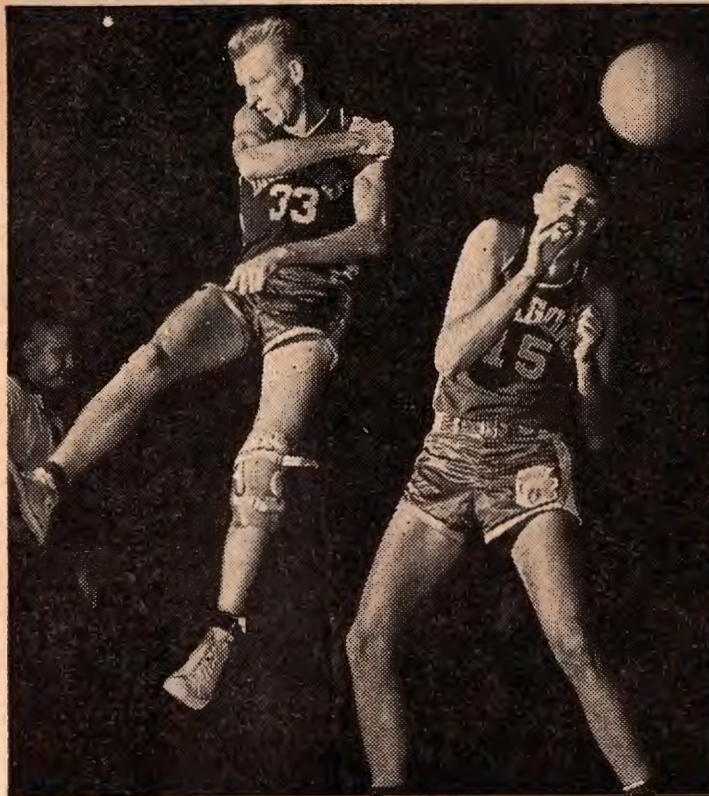
Paul Maae got into the act as he swept right end for what later proved to be the winning TD.

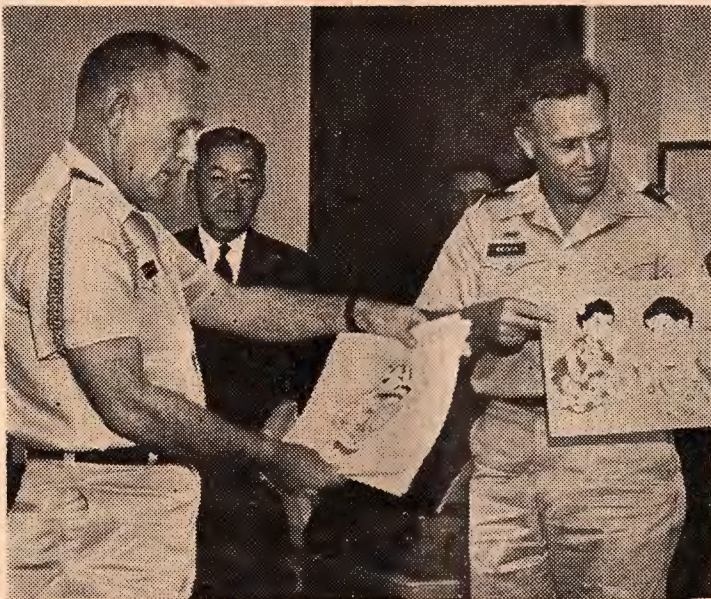
